

Town Beach open for the season

The Long Lake Town Beach is open for summer and the beach will be open and monitored by guards 10am – 6pm Wednesday to Sunday, and 8pm on Friday's when there is Music by the Lake. The Beach is closed on Mondays and Tuesdays until further notice. If staffing can be increased we will return to seven day a week operations.

The Town of Long Lake continues to seek Waterfront Lifeguards to fill out our summer roster. Pick up applications at the Long Lake Town Office building located at 1130 Deerland Road, Long Lake, NY. There is partial reimbursement available for training.

This year the beach will be offering swim lessons taught by Head Guard Maria Inserra. Sign-ups will be available at the Town Beach from July 5th – July 8th. The classes will run from July 12th until August 11th.

The church foundation was the first project, with 36 new concrete piers, followed by a new roof, new interior walls to match the original stencils, new stain on the outside and painted window trim. It is a site to behold! During July and August, the historic 1890 St. William's church building on Long Point is open. You are welcome to come in, ring the bell, and look around!

We have a great summer lined up! St William's on Long Point, Raquette Lake is excited to be able to offer our Thursday Evenings on the Lake Programs. The summer series begins Thursday, July 13th featuring Bruce Matthews performing his "front porch music." Mt Sabattis Mountain Bike Trails

The Town of Long Lake is pleased to announce the opening of more new single-track mountain bike trails at the Mt Sabattis Recreation Area. The Start Me Up Trail begins next to the tennis courts, with the remaining trails beginning in the parking lot of the Pavilion, and travel a total of 5km through the woods and field of Mt Sabattis. The trails were built as a multi-phase build plan by trail developer Wilderness Property Management, with Phase 3 being completed in the spring of 2023, including a continuation of the jump line, bringing the total to 18 jumps and 14 berms on that trail alone. The trails are named after Rolling Stones songs to commemorate Mick Jagger visiting Long Lake several times in the 1970s and 80s... and also because the Stones are awesome.



Hiking/Paddling Challenge Testimony

My name is Steve Saltsman, and my wife's name is Dondi Saltsma and together we just completed the entire Long Lake & Raquette Lake Hiking & Paddling Challenge to claim Sabattis Max status! We had a wonderful time completing the challenge and have come to love the Long Lake and Raquette Lake area. The best thing about the challenge is that it took us to places we may not have gone to, and to some places that were on our bucket list but we never made the time. A few places brought back fond memories as they were locations that we went to when our kids were young, some 20 years ago.

A little more about us; I turned 60 this year and my wife turned 59. We met in college and have been married for 34 years. We spent the year prior to starting the challenge on a health kick with a steady workout plan, and proper nutrition. I think I'm in the best shape I've been in since my early 20's and I can almost catch my wife now, she's a fast one.

My wife's favorite adventure was the kayak paddle across Lake Eaton with the hike up Owl's Head Mountain. We made the same trip in the early 2000's as a family with our two boys and as we reminisced our way up Owl's Head. She said South Pond was a close second.

My favorite adventure was Mud Pond. It was 29 degrees when we headed out

from the cottage we rented on Long Lake. As we drove up Kickerville Road there was a light dusting of snow, but we were all layered up with long johns, fleeces, and rain gear and had prepared for the weather. As we got ready to start the carry back to the pond we realized that one of our sets of wheels was broken, so my wife and I carried one kayak and I dragged the other on wheels. The extra effort just added a little ruggedness to the adventure. When we got to put-in, it wasn't the sandy beach I had envisioned, but instead was a rocky, treed shore with water deep enough to be refreshing on a warm summer day, but a potential problem in freezing temps. As luck would have it the wind picked up and pushed the kayaks as we tried to get in but fortunately, we are experienced, well prepared, and in good shape. Otherwise, this adventure could have been a write up in the ranger rescue section of the conservation magazine.

The wind died down a little, the views of the mountains with the fall colors was a gift from Mother Nature. The sound of the wind thundering through the mountains along with its bite on my cheeks reminded me that Mother Nature not only provides the beauty of the many colors of fall, but also will cast a fury on us that must be respected. We paddled the perimeter and up the inlet to the canoe carry leading to McRorie Pond

which set the stage for an adventure for another day. With only wilderness surrounding the pond, along with the solitude of being the only people on the pond was surreal. I had to drag my hand in the water just to feel and touch the plant life and boulders on the shore as I floated by as if they had special healing power. I think they did because we left the pond feeling great.

So, it's time for some technical data:

We started the challenge paddling Lake Eaton on 5/21/22


We completed the challenge paddling Forked Lake on 10/9/22.

We completed both the Dunning Cruiser and Rondeau Rambler on 7/1/22.

We completed the Sabattis Max on 10/9/22.

We stayed at Lake Eaton Campground, Eighth Lake Campground, and Donnelly's Sunset Point.

We ate at the Long View Lodge, Adirondack Hotel, Long Lake Diner, and got coffee at the Paradise Cove multiple times. We got groceries and miscellaneous items at Northern Borne, gas and ice cream at Stewart's, and more ice cream at Custard's Last Stand. We bought items from Long Lake residents during the Town Wide Garage Sale, bought more items at the Harvest Craft Fair, and even more at Octo-Bear-Fest. And we bought tickets and went to see the Hot Club of Buffalo at the Town Hall.

protect you from cold, heat, and rain.

Use maps to plan where you're going. Check them along the way so you'll stay on course and avoid getting lost. Learn about the areas you plan to visit.

#2- Stick to Trails and Camp Overnight Right

Walk and ride on designated trails to protect trailside plants. Camp only on existing or designated campsites to avoid damaging vegetation.
#3- Trash Your Trash and Pick Up Poop

Pack it in, pack it out. Put litter—even crumbs, peels and cores—in garbage bags and carry it home. Use bathrooms or outhouses when available. If they're not available, bury human waste in a small hole 6-8 inches deep and 200 feet or 70 big steps from water and the trail. #4- Leave It As You Find It

Leave plants, rocks, and historical items as you find them so others can enjoy them. Treat living plants with respect. Carving, hacking, or peeling plants may kill them. #5- Be Careful with Fire

Use a camp stove for cooking. Stoves are easier to cook on and create less impact than a fire. If you want to have a campfire, be sure it's permitted and safe to build a fire in the area you're visiting. Use only existing fire rings to protect the ground from heat. Keep your fire small.

#6- Keep Wildlife Wild
Observe wildlife from a distance and never approach,

feed or follow them. Human food is unhealthy for all wild-life and feeding them starts bad habits. Protect wildlife and your food by securely storing your meals and trash. #7- Share Our Trails and Manage Your Pet

Be considerate when

passing others on the trail. Keep your pet under control to protect it, other visitors, and wildlife. Be sure the fun you have outdoors does not bother anyone else. Remember, other visitors are there to enjoy the outdoors too.



Bear Necessities

Bear sightings are not uncommon in the Town of Long Lake and can and have occurred in numerous locations throughout our communities. It doesn't matter where a bear was sighted, the following is always important for everyone.

People who think they are doing wildlife a favor by feeding them and getting them used to humans are doing them a big disservice. Fed wildlife becomes problem wildlife, A FED BEAR IS A DEAD BEAR!

What causes Human-Bear Conflicts? The simple answer is food. Bears are more likely to seek out human food sources in the spring, when natural food is scarce, and in the summer, particularly during periods of drought. The leading cause of bear complaints in New York is bears getting into residential garbage and birdfeeders.

Please remove bird feeders from April 1 - November 30. New York's black bears begin emerging from their winter dens in mid to late March. Bird feed such as suet and seeds are a very strong attraction for bears, even if they can't reach it. The Feeding of Black Bears is Prohibited in New York, even the incidental, indirect feeding of black bears is unlawful.

Do not feed pets outside. Leftover food or even an empty dish can attract a bear.

Remove the grease can from grills after every use. Turn the grill on "High" for several minutes after you are done cooking to burn residual odors off the grill.

outside to attract any wildlife. Any food stuff used to attract birds, squirrels or other wildlife will also attract bears.

Do not operate refrigerators or freezers outside or on porches. Bears can smell what is inside.

Anything with an odor can attract a bear.

Mask garbage odors with ammonia-soaked rags.

Electric Fencing is an effective tool for keeping bears out of apiaries, chicken coops, compost, and gardens.

Bears are intelligent and opportunistic animals that will find and consume whatever food they can access most easily. Frequently, humans unknowingly create potential food sources for bears that may attract them into close proximity to residential areas and subsequently result in human-bear conflicts.

Feeding of Black
Bears is Prohibited in New
York. Never feed bears
intentionally; it is illegal and
creates human-bear conflicts.
DEC has adopted a regulation prohibiting the deliberate and intentional feeding
of black bears. The incidental, indirect feeding of black
bears also is unlawful after
a written warning has been
issued by the department.

If you have a bear conflict and need immediate attention in Long Lake call NYS Forest Ranger Melissa Milano 518-312-3982, or, call ECO Jared Newell (518) 257-9690

Bear encounters that include any break-ins or property damage should be reported to Ray Brook NYS DEC Region 5 by calling NYS DEC Region 5 Dispatch to report 518-897-1326.

To minimize the risk of a bear encounter the NYS-DEC recommends taking your garbage to the transfer station daily.

Helpful Tips:

Do not store garbage in cans outside of your homes.

Remove Bird Feeders Secure Garbage to Prevent Human-Bear Conflicts.

Clean all outdoor grills, do not leave any residue behind

Do not store or leave pet food outdoors.

Bears are opportunistic feeders and will remember where they find easy food, then return to that location frequently.

Intentionally feeding black bears is illegal.

Anything with an odor can attract a bear.

Mask garbage odors with ammonia-soaked rags.

Remove grease cans and filters after each use.

Do not operate fridges outside or on outdoor porches -bears can smell what is inside.

> While camping: Keep your campsite as

clean as possible.

Do not leave coolers or

food out at any time.

Do not keep food or



Treat toiletries as food


